Workshops were held on technology and the voice; studying, auditioning, and working in Europe; the Alexander Technique; college auditioning; and music theater. The highlight of the conference was two sessions by guest clinician, **Paul Sperry**. Mr. Sperry gave a Recital-Lecture on the American art song and also worked with students in an American art song master class.
